100 DAY GBVF CHALLENGE

In a powerful display of community solidarity, the Ikhwezi Women's Centre recently hosted a significant Women's Day campaign, marking a pivotal moment in the local fight against Gender-Based Violence and Femicide (GBVF)

The event, staged as a key part of the national 100 Day GBVF Challenge, brought together a united front of essential services to forge a stronger, survivor-centred network of support within the Amahlathi Local Municipality.

Gone are the days of working in silos. The campaign's core strength lay in its collaborative, multi sectoral approach, intentionally gathering the very pillars of support that survivors need to navigate their journey to safety and justice. The event served as a public pledge from each stakeholder, clearly outlining their role in the ecosystem of care.

Attendees heard directly from key agencies, each detailing their critical function.

South African Police Service (SAPS) emphasised their commitment to protecting victims, explained the process of reporting cases and obtaining protection orders and stressed the importance of evidence collection for successful prosecution.

Department of Justice & Constitutional Development, explained the legal process for survivors, outlining the court procedures and the support available to ensure their rights are

Department of Health, detailed the crucial medical services available, including immediate trauma care, confidential forensic examinations and preventative healthcare to protect survivors' well being.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS), highlighted their role as first responders, ensuring the rapid and safe transportation of survivors to medical facilities for urgent care during critical

Amahlathi Special Programs Unit (SPU), outlined the ongoing support, counselling and shelter referral services available, focusing on the long-term healing of survivors.

This initiative went beyond simply raising awareness. By placing all these services side-byside, the Ikhwezi Women's Centre facilitated a conversation about community accountability.

The message was clear, ending GBVF is not just the responsibility of the police or social workers: it is a collective duty.

The campaign aligns perfectly with the spirit of the 100 Day GBVF Challenge, a national call to action that encourages tangible, community driven efforts over a focused period.

The event concluded with a shared resolve to continue this collaborative spirit. By prioritising survivor centred action and fostering an environment where victims are believed and supported, the community of Amahlathi is taking significant strides toward creating a safer, more inclusive environment for all its women and girls.

STUTTERHEIM MASTER AND PRECINCT PLAN

As part of Goal 1 ,Social Sustainability under the broader vision of the Stutterheim Master Precinct Plan, a local initiative is making meaningful strides in transforming lives by equipping community members with practical, income generating skills.

This skills development program, introduced as a cornerstone of Stutterheim's revitalisation strategy, aims to tackle unemployment, promote economic inclusion and foster local entrepreneurship. By creating access to hands on training, mentorship and startup support, the project empowers individuals particularly youth and women to build sustainable livelihoods right within their own communities.

The training focused on leather crafting and cosmetics production. These two focus areas were strategically selected for their accessibility, market potential and alignment with local resources and talents.

Leather Crafting, from wallets to handbags, leather goods are in high demand both locally and beyond. Participants are taught everything from the basics of leatherwork to advanced techniques, enabling them to produce high quality, sellable products.

Cosmetics Production, with increasing awareness around self care and natural beauty, cosmetics present a promising avenue for small business development.

Trainees learn to make soaps, lotions and other skincare products using locally sourced ingredients, with an emphasis on sustainability and branding.

The initiative doesn't just stop at training. Participants are also supported in accessing local markets, developing their own product lines and even starting cooperatives or small businesses.

This approach aligns with the Amahlathi Municipality's commitment to longterm economic resilience and inclusive growth.

By investing in people and their potential, the project serves as a model of community led development, one that uplifts individuals while contributing to the collective well being of Stutterheim.

This initiative reflects the principles of social sustainability outlined in the Stutterheim Master Precinct Plan, emphasising human development, equity and resilience.

It's about more than just job creation it's about restoring dignity, fostering innovation and building a thriving local economy from the ground up.

The leather crafting and cosmetics production program is a powerful reminder that with the right tools, training and support, communities can create their own solutions and shape their own futures.





















DOHNE AGRICULTURAL INSTITUTE **OPEN DAY**

Agriculture took centre stage at the Dohne Agricultural Institute Open Day, hosted in partnership with the Eastern Cape Department of Agriculture and the Amahlathi Local Municipality.

Held in Stutterheim, the event brought together farmers, learners, scientists and universities to highlight the sector's growing role in the province's economy.

Clear skies and a vibrant programme set the tone for the day, which featured live demonstrations in animal production, crop management and hydroponics, along with the unveiling of a new Aquaculture Demonstration Facility aimed at boosting fish farming and rural skills development.

MEC Nonceba Kontsiwe delivered a strong message, "Given the unfortunate job losses in the automotive sector, we said the mine we have is the land." She affirmed agriculture's central place in the province's development strategy and urged youth to see it as a career of the future.

Learners explored careers in agriculture through a career expo, with Grade 11 student Ayabonga Waphi calling the experience "mesmerising." "Now I know agriculture feeds not just you, but the nation," he said.

The event also welcomed academic institutions including Rhodes University, University of Fort Hare, North West University and Walter Sisulu University, who showcased their agricultural research alongside Dohne scientists.

Portfolio Committee Chairperson DR Fundisile Bese called for deeper collaboration across sectors, saying, "We must put agriculture at the centre of development."

MEC Kontsiwe expressed her intention to make the Open Day an annual event, underlining the department's commitment to food security, youth empowerment and economic growth through agriculture.

BONZ INVESTMENT BUILDS NEW HOME FOR 103 YEAR OLD MAMA NOYHO PALAFINI

In a true act of Ubuntu, Bonz Investment has stepped in to restore dignity and hope to 103-year-old Mama Noyho Elsie Palafini, a beloved elder from Khubusi Village whose living conditions recently touched the hearts of many.

Her story came to light during a Mandela Day outreach earlier this year, when Amahlathi Local Municipality Mayor, Cllr. Nomakosazana Nogqayi, visited her home. The mayor was deeply moved by the difficult circumstances Mama Noyho was living under, conditions unbefitting anyone, let alone a woman of her age.

Motivated by compassion, the mayor made a public appeal for help, vowing to find a Good Samaritan who could bring change.

That call was answered by Bonz Investment.

In a remarkable gesture, the company has committed to building Mama Noyho a brand new home from the ground up. During a recent site visit, the Bonz Investment team not only assessed the land for construction but also delivered essential groceries and supplies to the family. The visit was emotional a day filled with tears, joy and renewed hope.

"This is more than charity, it's an act of humanity," said Mayor Nogqayi. "This government cares deeply for its people and we are proud to work hand in hand with stakeholders like Bonz Investment to bring dignity and change to our communities." The house, set to be completed before Christmas, will offer Mama Noyho a warm, safe and dignified place to call home. It's a powerful reminder of what's possible when businesses, communities and government come together for a common good.

What began as a routine visit has become a life changing moment not just for Mama Noyho, but for the entire village of Khubusi. Her story now stands as a symbol of compassion in action and the enduring spirit of Ubuntu.














"Let's uplift and empower our learners together," the Mayor said. "Partnerships like these are essential, especially when working with limited resources. Together, we can do more."

Matiwane emphasised the value of engaging with key stakeholders, including the Buffalo City Fresh Produce Market and other potential buyers.

The agricultural show is part of a broader initiative to promote market access and business opportunities for smallholder farmers. It serves as a platform for producers to network with industry players, buyers and support organisations.

To boost the agricultural sector, the department has partnered with key stakeholders, including the Buffalo City Municipality Fresh Produce Market, Eastern Cape Development Corporation, Small Enterprise Development Agency (SEDA) and the Amathole District Municipality.

Looking ahead, the department aims to host four agricultural shows annually, one per quarter to empower smallholder farmers and support sustainable agricultural development across the province.

Amahlathi Mayor, Cllr Nomakosazana Nongqayi, opened the session with a welcoming speech. She said she was excited and hopeful about progress in land reform, "I feel hopeful today, as we move closer to a better life for all. I've seen the Minister's commitment to resolving land issues, which remain sensitive and important."

The Mayor referred to the Minister's Budget Vote 42 speech on 10 July 2025, praising his consistency. She also reminded attendees of Vision 2030, adopted in 2012, which aims to eliminate poverty and reduce inequality. Land access is a key part of that plan.

"The land question is central to our history and struggle. We must use land to build a fair and just society," she said.

She closed by encouraging landowners to be active, "If you have land, work it. If you don't want to work it, lease it to someone who will. Let's feed the nation."

Minister Mzwanele Nyhontso then addressed the crowd. He listened to concerns and promised action, "I'm not here for fame, I'm here to solve problems and ensure payments are made."

He also emphasised support for women applicants, especially during Women's Month and said their applications must be prioritised.

READING AWARENESS PROGRAM



It also offered land claimants the opportunity to ask questions about their individual claims and receive updates on the expected timelines for payment.

This engagement marked a collaborative partnership between Amahlathi Local Municipality and other key stakeholders to ensure that land restitution is implemented in an integrated and inclusive manner that involves all relevant role players.

It also served to educate the Amahlathi community, empowering them with information on both old order and new order claims information that will assist them in effectively communicating with their communities and other beneficiaries of the restitution programme.



Under the theme "It's still in our hands to combat poverty and inequity," Amahlathi Local Municipality joined the nation in celebrating the legacy of Tata Nelson Mandela on his birthday. Embracing his spirit of unity and ubuntu, the municipality marked the day with impactful acts of service and care.

The commemorations began with 67 minutes of service, where volunteers gathered to clean and paint a child-headed household.
